

A big time "ATTAWAYTOGO" to Preston Brown, our newest honoree, into the CLH's Hall of Fame.



Preston and his cabinmates returned for many years and he still remains close to his camp friends. There was a good size group of Longhorn families from Alice, Tx. when Preston began his years at camp. Younger brother, Reagan, was a Rattlesnake in 1980 and his sister followed as a Palomino in 1984.... each to their Wrangler and Chief years and on.

Preston was honored as Campfire Lighter twice as a camper and Favorite as a counselor. From CIT in 1983 to his last summers a counselor in 1997, Preston wore many hats. 

The Colors Of The Rainbow Are Found At Camp Longhorn

I didn't know anything about summer camp or Camp Longhorn when my parents asked me if I would be interested in going. We went for a tour and, naturally, I loved what I saw. I interviewed with TEX in his office and answered questions about the colors of the rainbow and the difference between a female and male robin. He seemed impressed with my answers - and I left thinking, "Yes! I aced the test and I get to go to camp!"

My parents were a nervous wreck when they took me to the bus - worried that I would wonder why they'd sent me to this strange place for 3 long weeks where I knew virtually no one. But, all of their fears were alleviated when I hopped out of the cream colored station wagon with artificial wood paneling (you know the one) and saw a girl I'd met the summer before at a swim meet.

We started playing chase around the bus and, when it was time to go, we hardly looked back. I think we did manage to wave good-bye to our parents, but, for the most part, we were already in another world. How much of another world we wouldn't know ... at least not until a short bus ride and tub of fried chicken later.

I have so many memories of camp. I remember eating Captain Crunch, bacon, and Tang every morning for breakfast. I remember fighting like mad to stay on the blob that first year and eventually learning to do synchronized back flips with the other girls in my cabin.

I remember riding horses through the Indian burial grounds with one hand on the reigns and one hand in the air to pay our respects. I remember picking home grown tomatoes and eating them straight from the garden like apples, swimming in the horse troughs to cool off, and then seeing "Dr. JOE" several days later for a resulting ear infection.

I remember singing camp songs on the Sunshine Bus, learning the parts of a gun and a sail boat, doing a synchronized swan dive off of the 5 meter tower for the water show, whistling Snow White's, "Just whistle while you work" with a mouth full of saltine crackers during the Longhorn Cup, catching fish in the lake, clapping and singing for the cooks to come out and take a bow on chicken fried steak and apple crisp night, and getting into an eating contest with my cabin mates and consuming 5 sloppy Joes for dinner (not recommended).

I remember the inner peace I got from praying and singing together on Church Mountain. I remember the fresh orange slices we ate each year after the mile swim like no other orange slice before or since. But most of all, I remember the feeling of being at camp. It's a feeling that's hard to describe, but everyone who has ever been there knows what I'm talking

And I remember the people. All types of people from all different places each with something to contribute. There's just something about camp that brings out the uniqueness in everyone and celebrates it, It's a shaper of character, a creator of confidence, and a builder of bonds that truly last a lifetime.

And so it is that the girl I met and rode the bus with that first year of camp would go on to be my bunk mate and best friend. We didn't live in the same neighborhood or go to the same school, but when we were together at camp we were inseparable. We would go on to be counselors together after our first year of college and had the time of our lives

She eventually introduced me to her cousin, who I would later marry. And today, our children, along with our many nieces and nephews, are getting to go to camp together and hopefully feel that same indescribable feeling and form those same unbreakable bonds that will shape *them* for the rest of their lives.

Of course, as a parent of two campers, I am now getting to experience camp from a totally different perspective. Even before I had children, I knew I wanted to send them to Camp Longhorn. My husband and I joked that sending our kids to Camp Longhorn was part of our prenuptial agreement (in fact, it was the only provi-

When other parents in the neighborhood questioned how we could send our child away for "3 WHOLE WEEKS," I laughed and explained that 3 weeks was the perfect amount of time. Anything less would simply not be enough. But, the joke was on me. I soon found out that 3 weeks was entirely too long for me as a parent. Especially that first year when, despite all of my efforts to teach my daughter to write and properly address an envelope, I did not receive a letter until the end of the 2nd week of camp.

Things were so bad that year that I actually called camp just to make sure she was doing okay. They assured me that my daughter was having a great time, but, nevertheless, I was full of worry and regret. And as my husband and I drove down the dirt road to pick my daughter up that first year, I remember fighting back the tears and saying, "She's not doing this again for me. I am done. If she did not absolutely LOVE it here, she's not coming back.'

And the next thing I remember is our daughter running towards us with open arms and a huge smile. We hugged each other tight and I looked into her eyes and I said, "Did you have a good time?" And she immediately said, "Yes Ma'am!" And so I said, "But do you think 3 weeks might be a little too long?" And she said without hesitation, "No way!" And that was it... a camper was born.

second child to camp for the first time although, truth be told, I did call camp once to check on her because "her eyes looked a little sick in the pictures."

I've always maintained that going to Camp Longhorn was, by far, the best thing I ever did as a kid. It was a gift and I feel so fortunate to be able to pass that gift on to my kids. Like so many things in life, you don't always know where certain roads are going to lead. And often times the best things come from unexpected turns and unmarked paths. I certainly didn't know what I was getting into when I was sitting in TEX's

office talking about the colors of the dian Springs (1 year) and BILLY (4), rainbow so many years ago. But, I know I found a pot of gold at the end of that rainbow in Camp Longhorn.

Yesterday and Today: How Camp Longhorn is Exactly The Same And Completely Different

My time at 1980s Camp Longhorn during the early days of "Ranch Branch" was always a trip from the .normal" world to a truly different place. The bus ride took me from a suburban life with shopping malls, busy streets, restaurants and television to a place where there were no roads, no cars and no parents. If there was a clock at Camp Longhorn, I never found it.

My Camp Longhorn had one cabin per year and a pretty simple progression. Every year you moved up one cabin. We had a mix of grass and ranchland with some small trees with some shade. We had one lake and one Blob and valiant attempts at sailing on still waters. We also had Church Mountain with beautiful views, a cool tree house for cabin getaways, and a horse corral located just a short trail ride from the location of many important historical events, or so I was told.

It was a small place isolated from the real world and a great place to spend part of the summer. We had no contact with our parents other than a few letters back and forth. Everyone got a tan and we could tell if someone was visiting camp from the "outside world."

By the end of my Wrangler year, I knew I'd never be able to swim the mile as fast as my friend KEVIN DUVAL and I'd never be able to fall off the trolley, drop about 25 feet, and belly flop on the water with the grace of my friend DAVID GLASSCOCK. For those that don't know, if you swim a mile, you get one merit and if you fall off the trolley, plummet to the Earth and make a huge splash in the water - you also get one merit.

I arrived on a bus as a camper and drove away in a car as a counselor eight years later. I thought my CLH time was done, but I got married and had kids. Two and a half decades after I had left, we put them on a bus headed back to the same place.

A few hours after we put them on the bus, my wife and I knew their cabin name and that night we were able to see a picture of our kids with their cabin at camp. It's great to know that your kids made it to camp, got off the bus, and found their cabin. I'm sure that in the history of camp every one of the kids have made it from the bus to the cabin, but as the parent of a new camper it's great to see them on the other side.

Over the next three weeks, we looked at pictures every night. My wife did not go to camp, so I had to explain a lot. I made comments like "That's the Chow Hall and WOW it's bigger" or "That's the campfire area and WOW it's bigger" or "Those are the Blobs and WOW they have more

We also received some excellent mail from camp. Our kids'good intentions of giving us a daily diary ended with hasty "gofta run" conclusions. GRACYN (11), HUDSON (9) AND HAYS (5). Here are STACY'S delicious recipes . .

Gma Priddy's Coffee Cake

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cup original Bisquick mix
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 Tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 egg

- Topping
 3 Tablespoons butter
- Cinnamon sugar

Heat over to 35 degrees. Grease an eight inch square pan. In a large bowl, mix together Bisquick, sugar, milk, oil, vanilla and egg. Beat by hand or an electric mixer until smooth. Pour into pan. Make for 30-35 minutes until toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

While the cake is still hot rub the butter over the top until all the butter melts evenly on top of the cake. Immediately sprinkle a generous amount of cinnamon sugar over the top. Enjoy!

Chicken Enchiladas

Ingredients:

- 1 lb. cooked chicken breast (shredded)
- 1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 can (4.5 oz) chopped green chilies
- 2 cans (10 oz.) Old El Paso green chili enchilada sauce
- 3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 12 flour or wheat tortillas (fajita size)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease 13 x 9 x 2 inch rectangular baking dish. Cook, cool and shred chicken. In a saucepan, mix shredded chicken, cream cheese (cubed), green chilies and 1/2 can of enchilada sauce. Cook and stir until blended and cream cheese is melted. Spoon chicken filling onto tortillas; roll up and place seam side down in baking dish. Pour remaining enchilada sauce over the top (1 1/2 cans). Sprinkle with cheddar cheese. COVER with foil. Bake, covered, for 30 minutes. Enjoy!

Crockpot Gumbo

Ingredients:

1/3 cup flour 1/3 cup vegetable oil 3 cups chicken broth

12-16 oz. smoked sausage (cut about 1/2" thick)

2-3 cups diced cooked chicken 1 cup chopped onions

1/2 cup chopped green pepper 1/2 cup chopped celery 4 cloves garlic - minced

Salt, to taste

1/2 tsp. pepper 1/4 tsp. ground red pepper Hot cooked rice

For roux, in a HEAVY saucepan, stir together flour and oil until smooth. Cook over medium-high heat for 4 minutes, STIRRING CONSTANTLY! Reduce heat to medium. Continue to cook, stirring constantly, for about 15 minutes or until roux is dark, reddish brown in color. Let roux cool. Add chicken broth to a 3 1/2 to 6 quart slow cooker. Stir in roux. Add sausage, chicken, onion, green pepper, celery, garlic, salt, pepper and red pepper. Cover and cook on low for 8 to 10 hours or high for 4 to 5 hours. Serve over hot cooked rice.

24 pack of King's Hawaiian rolls 1/2 lb. shaved Virginia ham or Honey baked ham

3/4 stick of butter 1 tsp Dijon mustard 1 tsp Worcestershire

12 slices Swiss cheese 1 tsp poppy seeds Slice the King's Hawaiian rolls in half. Line the bottom of a 9 x 11


baking dish with the bottoms of the rolls (these should just fit). Place the ham over the rolls and then layer the Swiss cheese on top. Place the other halves of the rolls on top. Set aside. In a small saucepan, combine the butter, mustard, and Worcestershire

sauce. Heat over medium heat until the butter has melted to form a sauce. Pour equal parts of the sauce over the rolls and then sprinkle the poppy seeds on top. Cover the pan tightly with aluminum foil and refrigerate for at least three hours or even better -- overnight!

WHERE?


