PAM is excited about a two week mission trip she will be taking in July to Gaba, Uganda to work with children from an orphanage and with teachers in the local school.

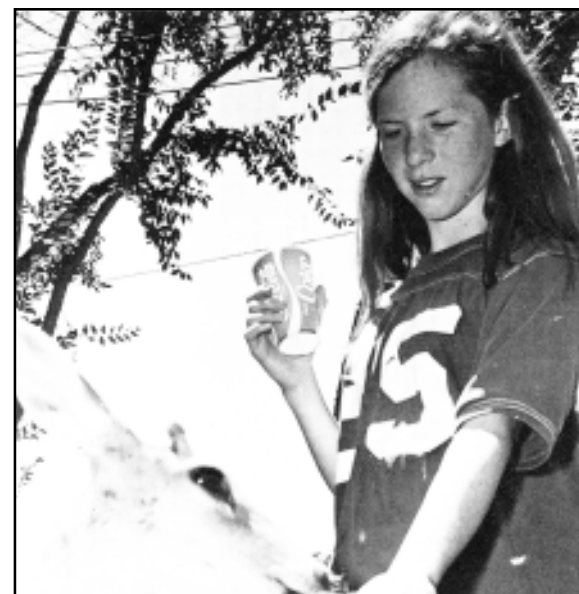

Her very successful book "PADDLEFISH" is a nonfiction account of training and racing in the 2010 Texas Water Safari, a 260-mile paddling race from Central Texas to the Gulf Coast. She shares all the raw grit, hilarity and emotion of life as a complete novice paddler in "The World's Toughest Race."

She left corporate life fourteen years ago in favor of writing, public speaking and being a homeroom mom. In 2007 she started blogging about her passion, fly-fishing, and before long readers were tuning in regularly to read her stories and share their own.

This fishing crowd introduced her to the Texas Water Safari Race and a publisher offered her a book deal to write about her experience as a novice paddler. Her book was first pub-

What Camp Longhorn Means To Me . . . A Changing View

When HELEN asked me to write something for LUMNews I hesitated at first, but her insistence that I would do a great job with it convinced me. All that was left was figuring out what to actually write. After the deadline she had asked me to get my piece to her by passed, I figured that I would just sit down and try to write out what Camp meant to me.

To start with, the significance and meaning of Camp Longhorn has definitely changed for me over the years. I started out as a Rattlesnake at Indian Springs and my first four years camp was really just all about having fun. It was a place to go for three weeks (I was a third term (3 is 1)) to get away from parents and avoid what seemed like any adult supervision.

I remember my counselors more as big brothers teaching you what you can do at camp and how to have the most fun. Certainly it was great to see friends every year, but camp for me meant Blobbing and Trollying and unfortunately at the time Mile Swimming (I was a soccer player and more comfortable running and could have run a mile in a quarter of the time it took me to swim it). All of this changed after my Jackrabbit year.

The school year after that year was not a good one for me. I struggled with teachers I didn't like and a child's annoyance with school and ended up with as more C's and D's than A's and B's. At the end of the school year I was just glad it was over and was ready to go to camp. That was when my parents sat me down and explained that Camp Longhorn was a privilege and not a right. It had to be earned and the way an 11 year-old earned something was by doing well in school. Since I most certainly hadn't done well in school I missed a year of camp. I don't remember the details of that conversation, but I can remember my shock at it and the loss I felt that summer. Needless to say, I never struggled that much at school again.

When I got back to camp after missing a year, what going to camp meant to me had evolved. Not only was I older, but I knew what a summer of your friends enjoying camp without you was like. I didn't take it for granted by thinking it was just about fun.

I became better friends with my cabin mates and started appreciating my counselors and the adults at camp for providing me to opportunity to come to this most fun of places. As I got into my Wrangler and Ranger years Camp starts giving you actual responsibilities outside of simply having fun and following the rules. Now I was one of the "older brothers" that got to introduce the fun of camp to the younger campers. I'm not sure why this meant so much to me, but I knew that I wanted to come back to camp as a counselor. Not only to continue to have fun at CLH, but to give back in a sense and to follow in the footsteps of the counselors that I had looked up to. And again, what camp meant to me changed and evolved.

As a counselor the fun and enjoyment you get from a summer at Camp

Longhorn is quite a bit different than being a camper. Instead of having fun Blobbing and Trollying and the Mile (I'm not going to lie, I never found the Mile Swim fun, but did learn to appreciate what finishing it represents) ... anyway, as a counselor the fun comes from spending time with your friends, the fellow counselors, and working with the kids and seeing them grow in the short time they are at camp. For a while I was annoyed with DAVID for sticking me in Division 1 for so many terms, but it truly is a joy to be able to teach a Rattlesnake what Camp is.

There comes a certain sense of pride in watching a group of shy, hesi-

tant 8 year-olds grow together as a cabin through the term and after 2 or 3 weeks watching them march their parents around camp like they owned the place. Through my years as a counselor I grew as a person and leader and was honored to be asked to join Staff. All of this meant significantly more to me than what having fun had. Camp had become more than just a place to go to have fun during the summer, it had become part of who I was. It felt like home and everyone at camp was family.

Unfortunately, there are only so many years that I had my summers free to spend at camp and now that I no longer get to enjoy summers at Indian Springs camp's meaning has again evolved.

As I sit typing this and reflecting on my years at Camp I can realize the impact my summers here had on my life outside of camp. I have made friends that I truly care about and gained experiences that helped me get to where I am. I had the opportunity to work with men that I look up to in DAVID and BOBBY and DON and learn about leadership and management and how to be a better person from them. I am in a better position to be successful in my life because of my time at Camp Longhorn and that means the world to me.

Attawaytobe At Camp . . . It's As Much A State Of Mind As A Place

There are certain amazing things about camp that one only can value in recollection; there are the tangible and incredibly significant life-long friendships that grow from camp bonds, and then there are the gifts that become part of your everyday that you received from camp without even being aware.

The Wheel of Fortune, not the long run syndicated television game show, but the Camp Longhorn Carnival Night game where campers line up to eagerly await the spin and win, is a metaphor for this gift. For most this game may seem a standard carnival ride, but there are nuances in every bit of camp; this we all know. With such options as, "Marry the Person Behind You," or "Dance for a Prize," appearing as wedges in the wheel's pie, the spinner has no other destiny than what the spin of the wheel decides.

What's important here is not the actual fortune—though I know of no other place where anyone and everyone can be joined in the bonds of holy macaroni - what's important is the moment where a camper spins and lets go of control. It's that instance when fear and insecurities have no place, where the pressure to be good or successful isn't an option. The gift is the moment, the moment that happens over and over, day and night, at camp. The moment that provides the rare opportunity to be present in something that is simply unpredictable. They are contagious, these moments that are selfless and full of possibility, and they spread through camp like no other place.

The wheel asks participants to join in the fun, be a part of the Carnival, the ride, the dance of a few summer weeks spent in utter delight. Campers make the choice to step in line, but they let camp take the reins and provide an atmosphere of joy, generosity, camaraderie, energy, enthusiasm and spirit.

The only thing camp requires of its campers is to be wide-awake, to be open to trying new things, and to be thrilled at the idea of taking on a

challenge and completing it (can I get a Mile Swim). This is a skill that I thank my lucky stars for acquiring at camp: the extremely valuable ability to be present in a moment.

In life away from 78611, there are pressures and structures that demand attention. The gift of being mindful and the ability to join the present moment gives my life so much more meaning and value. Beyond the life-long friendships, this is the gift that was shared with me without me even being aware. This is one of those gifts that keeps giving. Behind the Wheel of Fortune, camp teaches us to be comfortable and trust that if one engages with the present and lets go of all assumptions, that life will be a reward in itself.

As Alumni, we are so fortunate; every year we have the opportunity to spend a day in this world. After a mini-camp, the microcosm of CLH seems so distant from our daily lives one often laments returning to the "real world." There is nothing more "real" than camp. Camp is a place where reality is saturated with the gift of the present. Live in the present and just like at camp, everything will be a celebration.

JOHAN yelling, "tiller towards the sail" over the loud speaker in that South African accent ... rest period with the sprinkler on the roof would put anyone to sleep . . . the funny signs on the main road ... bug spray and ear drops ... the old super slide . . . movie night ... listening to BOB TARTLTON tell a story in the dark when all you could see was the glow of his cigarette ... the mud . . . liquid kill ... raids ... Leslie's fried chicken in Waco on the way down horses at Inks (I know, that's how old I am) ... flashlight wars when it rained ... the sound of cicadas in the trees ... the Bluebonnet Cafe. . . one match! ... having PAT present me with my 9th year ring at campfire ... the water show . . . the carnival and "getting married" in a canoe ... inspections ... 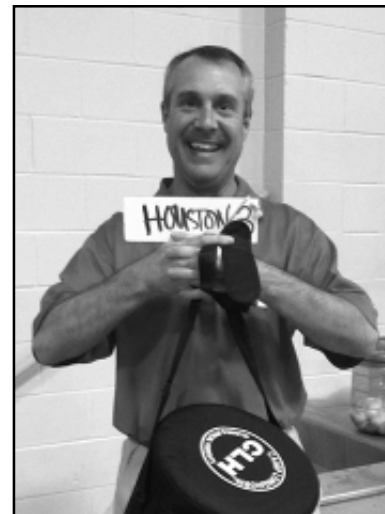

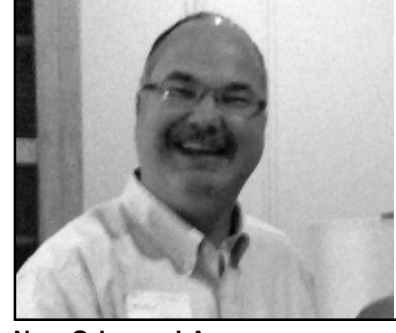

- After campfire there will be free time - unplanned activities. For those who wish to stay on the grounds we will have marshmallows and smores and evening Rio Flojo fun!

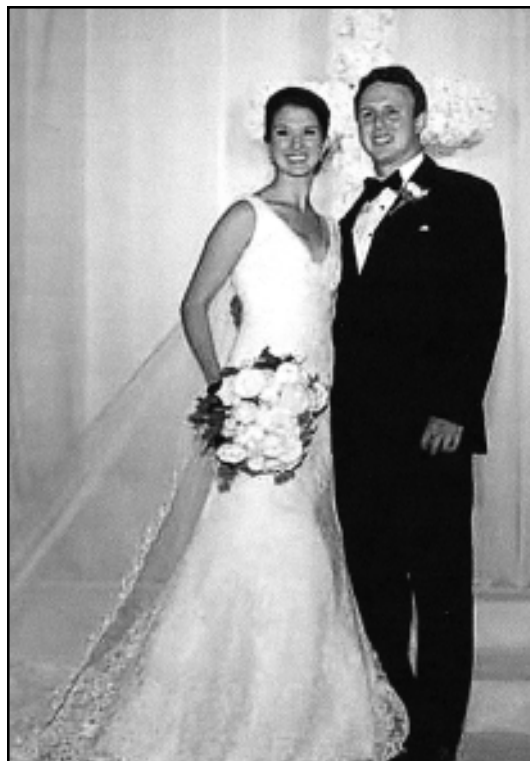
- It's early to rise on Sunday morning with pancakes, bacon, fruit, etc. at BARNEY's Chow Hall and some great, strong coffee, too!

What's Cookin'?

The following recipes are from the kitchen of BETH McBRIDE WILHELMI, Alumni and wife of Alumni JEREMY WHILEHLMI, many, many years campers and counselors at CLH Indian Springs. They have 3 adorable boys . . . KLEIN (11), JACKSON (9) and MIGHTY (7) . . . The two older boys attend CLH Indian Springs and MIGHTY is a future camper! DON and SUSAN WILHELMI are grandparents!

Crawfish Cornbread Dressing

Ingredients:

- 10 tablespoonbutterormargadne
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 small green bell peppers, chopped
- Make a box of combread and crumble
- 1 (16-ounce) package frozen peeled, cooked crawfish tails, thawed
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1 teaspoon ground white pepper
- 1 teaspoon ground red pepper
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper

Preparation:

Melt butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat; add onion and bell pepper, and saute 4 to 5 minutes or until tender.

Stir together vegetables, cornbread, and remaining ingredients in a large bowl until moistened. Spoon into a lightly greased 13- x 9-inch baking dish.

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until firm and golden brown.

Emeril's Burger Seasoning

Ingredients:

- 2 1/2 Tbsp Paprika
- 2 Tbsp Table Salt
- 2 Tbsp Garlic Powder
- 1 Tbsp Onion Powder
- 2 Tbsp Black Pepper
- 2 Tbsp Ground Mustard
- 1 tsp Cayenne Pepper

Combine all ingredients in a mixing bowl and stir to blend thoroughly. Store in an airtight container. Use 2-3 teaspoons per pound of ground beef, turkey, or chicken.

Goey Butter

Bottom Layer:

- 1 yellow cake mix
- 1/2cup melted butter
- 2 eggs

Mix & pat into greased 9 x 13 pan.

Top Layer:

- 8 oz. cream cheese softened
- 1 lb powdered sugar (1 box)
- 2 eggs

Mix top layer and spread on top of bottom layer (withholding 1 Tbsp of powdered sugar to sprinkle on top). Sprinkle sugar on top. Bake 40 - 45 minutes at 350 degrees or until golden brown and not runny in the middle.

Maple Balsamic Dressing

Ingredients:

- 2 shallots, finely diced
- 2 tsp. Dijon mustard
- 4 tsp. balsamic vinegar
- 1/2 c. olive oil
- 4 tsp. maple syrup
- Pepper

Preparation:

Combine the chopped shallot, Dijon mustard, and balsamic vinegar in a large bowl. Slowly drizzle in the olive oil while you whisk to emulsify. Add the maple syrup and season, to taste, with salt and peper.

I could not wait until the summer of 2012 when BRYAN and I put GEORGIA on the bus for the first time. Just as anxious, I cannot wait until the summer of 2015, when we put GREER on the bus for the first time. My non-CLH mommy friends think I am nuts. All of my CLH friends completely understand and can relate. I was so excited about GEORGIA going to camp for the first time that I got out my trusty camp trunk of 14 years. I wanted to go too!

I was a 3rd Term camper so naturally I wanted my girls to go 3rd Term too. When it was time to place GEORGIA, BILL called and asked me what I thought about 2nd Term. I did not know what to say and with so many thoughts racing through my mind, I finally realized how ridiculous I was being. It does not matter what term GEORGIA goes as long as she has the same positive experience that I had. I wanted nothing more than for her to love CLH as much as I did and continue to love.

I quickly learned GEORGIA would be starting camp with a little girl, whose mother and I started camp together in the Wren cabin in 1983. In addition, a handful of other little girls whose mothers I went to camp with. My thought - how special is that! It was a sign, it does not matter the term, GEORGIA is just where she needs to be at Camp Longhorn! This notion was even more evident this winter when I took the girls ice-skating on a trip to Houston. A girl skated up to GEORGIA and said, "Don't you go to Camp Longhorn?" GEORGIA confirmed her thought and they exchanged hellos and see you this summer! It is the CLH connection, and my first year camper is already experiencing it.

When BILL delivered GEORGIA's annual, he asked me how it felt to have a camper. Without hesitation, I simply replied that I have come full circle and it is special to share similar stories and experiences with GEORGIA. After 30 years of my first year at CLH, some things have changed, but so much more has not, and that is the beauty of Camp Longhorn. I love and cherish that I can share and relate to GEORGIA's first year experiences, and I am looking forward to reminiscing with her, as well as GREER, year after year until it is my grandchild's turn to be a first year camper. Therefore, the truth about TEX is that today TEX is bigger than any person is, and his work has gone on longer than any of us have lived and will live. It is important for all of us present and past to hold the privileges and traditions of Camp Longhorn sacred.

I cannot begin to thank my parents enough for making the all-important

decision to send me to Camp Longhorn and hope my girls will feel the same. Thank you TEX & PAT and thank you to the ROBERTSON family, the FRADY family, and all campers, counselors and staff who have passed through the famous gate to help keep the integrity that was founded 74 years ago!!!

We thank you, KRISTIN URBAN KEMMETT, for such special memories you have of Camp Longhorn! A story full of sooo many memories . . . some amusing, some heartwarming and ALL from a special person . . . camper, counselor and Alumni! I had not thought of Dr. Schwartz in a while but your story brings back sooo many memories of TEX in his coon hat and bags of . . . as you call them . . . creepy crawly creatures! KRISTIN was raised in Carizzo Springs, TX and lives there now with husband BRYAN and girls GEORGIA (9) and 2013 will be her 2nd year at CLH Inks Lake and GREER (6), a future camper! KRISTIN was a camper for 9 years and counselor 5 years at Inks Lake. Music Was And Is A Big Part Of The CLH Experience



CAMP LONGHORN IS MUSIC TO MY EARS . . .

It's July 1963, just after Chow Hall time on a warm, sunny afternoon. I am a Cabin 5 Badger walking by the Canoe Bay headed in the direction of Cabin 4. Coming through the loud speakers that cover the Boys Camp, "Talk To Me" by Sunny and the Sunglows is playing. I really don't think anything of it. It's Rest Period, and music is always playing at that time of day.

But as I look back on it now 50 years later, I realize how much I loved that music at Rest Period and how popular music permeated so much of our camp experience, whether it was tunes spun by the likes of Jumpin' Joe from the Ramble Hut after lunch, songs that woke us up every morning or the records like 'Sweet Pea' and "Hanky Panky" played on Dance Night each Thursday.

Who could forget being greeted at 7 a.m. each day with songs like "Ahab The Arab", "Does Your Chewing Gum Lose Its Flavor On The Bed Post Over Night," "Tie Me Kangaroo Down Sport" or "Hello Mudduh, Hello Fadduh"? Those last two actually made their debuts in 1963, and "Tie Me Kangaroo" is still the official wakeup tune at Inks Lake Mini-Camp each year. And given all the scratches that come across the speaker system Robby probably is playing the original 45 from 50 years ago.

Songs also filled the air each Sunday on Church Mountain, songs like "Sinner Man" and "Cum By Ya." Let's also not forget the best of them all, the Camp Longhorn song. I still know every word and sing it occasionally! And when each day was done and the campfire was burning low, singing "Taps" was the way we all said "Good Night" to each other.

I love music, and I love Camp Longhorn, and when I hear songs that were played while I was at Camp in the 60's, it takes me back to those lazy (although they were full of activities!) days of summer in the hills and dales of the Hill Country.

So in celebration of music and our camp, I thought I'd take at least some of you back to the summer of 1963 - 50 years ago this summer - with a list of the #1 songs that topped the Billboard Hot 100 and played throughout that summer at the greatest Camp on Earth!

Ingram STAR Power Extends To His Home Life

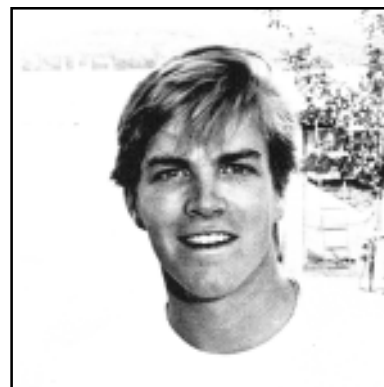
A cute article and picture we found on the Internet about JACK INGRAM and his Star Reward System he uses with his kids! It's about merits and de-merits only he calls them Stars!

If one of his children does something that deserves a reward he gives them a Star and if they do something that he deems negative behavior, then a Star is taken from the child.

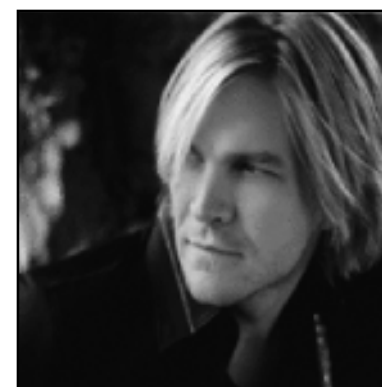
He keeps track of the count on his Blackberry because it was extremely hard and confusing to give Stars away from home and his count was at home on the frig!
